On Feb. 11th, 2005 JoAnne Matsumura and Judy Hastings went to The Enumclaw Rehab Center and showed a slide show and talked about the Black Diamond Museum to the residents.

The Black Diamond Community Center will be holding their annual Family Resource Night at the Elementary School on May 3rd this year. Judy Hastings is planning on being there to hand out brochures and talk to the visitors about the Museum and the educational programs that are available. A couple of "Black Diamond - Mining the Memories" books will be amongst the door prizes.



Memories from the Past

It was a warm summer day that August 31st of 1936. She was standing on the Observations narrow boardwalk over the falls at the Green River Gorge, and enjoying the spray to cool her off from the warm summer heat. As she admired the beautiful scenery she decided to write that evening when she returned to Portland, Oregon, to Miss Margorie Redshaw in North Dakota about her visit to Black Diamond, and the Green River Gorge.

"Mrs. Ace took us to the Green River Gorge where it is awfully nice. The water was just roaring down. Would like to live here. Wish you were here with me. All the places marked with an X (on a post card of the Green River Gorge Falls) I have been. I picked up a stone for you from these Cascade Mountains. I have pressed all kinds of fruit leaves and shook a



plumptfull of a tree and ate 2. Saw grapes on vines, apples, apricots, walnuts, peaches, pears, & every fruit. The people we are staying with are very nice. Saw some cowboy & they are homlier than a mud fence. Any book that says they're handsome is goofy, Ha Ha. Was lots of fun. Awfully pretty here. Lots of brooks & trees. IN MEMORIAM

≭ Ernesta Franchini Vander Heyden

She was known as Esther and in later years Ernesta. She was born on February 10, 1908 in Tuscany, Italy and passed away January 19, 2005. Ernesta, her two older sisters and mother arrived in Black Diamond, WA in 1909, where her father had just started work as a coal miner. Ernesta was the last surviving child of 8 children.

Ernesta was one of the three eldest surviving classmates of the Black Diamond High School graduating class of 1926. She is a member of the Black Diamond High School Alumni.

She was a Lifetime member of the Society and was a faithful donor. We enjoyed seeing her on her frequent visits to the Museum, attending the Membership Meetings and bringing her family over the years.

Enesta gave of her time in volunteer work with 45 years to the Red Cross, teaching First Aid at most of the volunteer fire departments in North King County and South Snohomish county, and later Arlington's Food Bank. She worked for the Lake Washington School District in special education while living in Woodinville, WA from 1945 to 1976. By 2000 she had moved to Totem Lake.

Survivors include her children, James, Jeanette and Vanesa.

Elsie, as she was known, was born April 29, 1920, to Henry (Harry) Corbin and Elsie J. Young Thompson. She passed away February 16, 2005. Was raised, schooled in Black Diamond, WA, and was a Graduate of the Black Diamond High School



Class of 1938. She is a member of the Black Diamond High School Alumni.

She was the last surviving child of six children.

Elsie worked for the Department of Licenses, and at the White River Lumber Co. until 1942 when she married Jack Marchetti. He preceded her in death in 1988, as did her parents, three brothers; William, Robert, and John Thompson, two sisters; ClaraEtta Callero and Violet Campbell.

Elsie and Jack operated a small store in Black Diamond. She was also employed as a bank teller, escrow clerk and then to escrow officer

Elsie became a Society Lifetime member in 1983 and was a frequent donor. Her contributions to the Museum, and Archives of school memorabilia is held in perpetuity for future generations.

She is survived by her daughter Merrilee Jay Brownell, grandson Sean Brownell, granddaughters and a great-grandson, Wesley Moore.

COMPLETES FORTY YEARS IN SERVICE OF COMPANY

"Celebrating the completion of 40 years in the service of the Pacific Coast Coal Company, Supt. J. J. Jones of Black Diamond, last Monday, August 6, enjoyed a family reunion at Lake Sawyer.

On August 6, 1883, J. J. Jones entered the service of the Pacific Coast Coal Company. Since that time his work has been almost continuously associated with the activities of the Company, with but two exceptions, one a short time spent on a farm and the other during his stay in Alaska.

He began as an oiler and sprager at Black Diamond, working one year at that task. The next year he was a gangway tender in the mine, after which he put in one year at each of the following tasks-mule driver in mine, chute starter and loader, timberpacker and helper, timberman and tracklayer.

Then for four years straight he worked digging coal, but left that to put in a year as a shot-lighter. One year was then utilized in acquiring a business college training, followed by a year as timekeeper.

For three years he worked as a fireboss, going from that position to foreman and general foreman for four years before he entered the ranks as a superintendent. In all, Supt. Jones has remained in that capacity with the Pacific Coast Coal Company for thirteen years.

The only time not spent with the Company included four years on his father's ranch, one year in Alaska prospecting, and two years in charge of the Guggenheim coal properties in Alaska.

No one need ask Supt. Jones for the secret of his success. It's readily evident in the warmth of his smile and the genial radiance of his personality, behind which lies a dauntless determination to accomplish the tasks to which he sets himself.



The Black Diamond Cemetery has great historic value. Our Museum Board came up with the idea to photograph all of the headstones. We will then merge them with the cemetery records, and upon request, we will be able to provide the public with a photo of any headstone.
