SECRETARY REPORT By Dee Israel July, Aug. & Sept. 2004

ARCHIVES: Chairperson JoAnne Matsumura reported that the quilts that are hanging on the walls in the book room of the Black Diamond Elementary School have now been donated



to the Black Diamond Historical Society. At this time they will remain at the school. JoAnne has also advised that a 3-ring binder is being filled with copies of articles that have to do with the town of Franklin and will be available to peruse at the front desk.

The OLD TOWN sign of businesses that was on the corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Baker blew down in one of our windstorms of last winter. It is in the process of being replaced by The Black Diamond Merchants.

FACILITIES & GROUNDS: President Steve Israel has power washed the steps and handrails and Don Mason has painted the handrails and put a preservative on the steps. The pickets on the front porch have now been painted white and the trash container red. Steve and Don Botts have pruned back the junipers along the railroad tracks.

**NEWSLETTER/WEBSITE:** Chair Steve Israel has been in contact with Society Member Mike Pennachi who says he has been very busy but would

like to help the Museum by setting up their website at the end of August. In the mean time, he will make a link between our new and old website.

**TOURS:** Chair Don Mason advised he recently had a busload of about 50 people from the National Railroad Assoc. come for a tour of the Museum.

**VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR:** Don Botts is still trying to locate members that could be a Docent at the Museum occasionally. If you or someone you know can help out, please call 360-886-2142 to volunteer. At this time we need help on the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of each month, but if you don't want to be tied down to a schedule, you can volunteer for just an occasional time.

PROGRAMS: Several cooks came to the Cook for the Cooks day and everyone seemed to have a good time. There was a feast of hamburgers or hotdogs (bar-b-cued by President Steve Israel), salads and desserts brought in by Society members who aren't normally the cooks. Each of the celebrated cooks received a corsage from the Society. Kathleen Kear, (the Voice of the Valley newspaper reporter) took a picture of the cooks and wrote an article about the celebration for the paper.

Coal Miner Days was on Friday and Saturday (July 16 & 17). President Steve Israel had a demonstration of old wood working tools. It was a couple of fun days.

We had a favorable response regarding the Cemetery Tour last fall, after the Membership Meeting, so we are doing it again this year. (Hopefully it won't rain on us this year.)

LABOR DAY: Chair Dee Israel advised that the same train as last year represented the Black Diamond Museum in the parade. Brian Mead was persuaded to be the engineer in the locomotive. His mother (Nancy Mead) and Dee Israel were the passengers in the passenger car and Brian's father (Clayton Mead) was the

brakeman in the caboose. Society Members Brock and Tamie Deady and their children had coal buckets filled with what looked like coal, (but was actually chocolates wrapped in black foil) to throw out to the spectators along the parade route. The Boehm's Candy Company in Issaquah furnished the candy, and only charged the Society for the special wrapping to resemble coal. Thanks to all of you, the train was greeted merrily along the parade route. I would also like to thank Society Members Mel and Junette Larson for letting us use their carport to store the train until the start of the parade, and Don Botts & JoAnne Matsumura for being Docents and greeting the 150 guests that visited the Museum on Labor Day.

#### Esther Vernarelli Babb July 4, 1910 - July 1, 2004

Esther was born in Black Diamond, Washington, born to Stephano and Elisabetti Vernarelli, living there all her life. She died at her home with her family by her side.

A Memorial Service was held July 7, 2004 at St. Barbara Church in Black Diamond, Father Chuck officiating. Inurnment took place at Enumclaw Cemetery.

Esther's name in Italian is Celestra; Cel derived from Celestial meaning heavenly or sky blue and estra apparently meaning Esther. Her Mother called her simply Ce'le, but some of the nieces and nephews called her Ce'la - Ce as in cello and la as in laugh.

In her youth, Esther demonstrated a talent in artwork - paintings and personalized greeting cards with superb handwriting - calligraphy. She was skilled in cooking and canning and should have written the book on dieting. While Esther was down to earth, she had an appreciation for eternal, heavenly things and at times describing heaven, referring to the Lord Jesus. Her laugh was easy and frequent and she was generally an up beat person and funny.

Esther was community minded and served in various activities. During World War II she served as an Observer involving enemy aircraft sighting for Black Diamond. She associated herself with the Black Diamond Senior Center, Sons of Italy Lodge, Rebecca Lodge, and the Black Diamond Historical Society (Museum).

For a number of years, Esther worked at the Buckley School for Children with special needs, and at the Black Diamond Bakery preparing the dough for the oven.

Once in a while she made a special trip, like going to the Hawaiian Islands to visit her daughter Nadine.

Esther was a caregiver, especially in time of need for her father, mother, husband and daughter,



and for her pets. She had a number of dogs and cats. Nikki - a spot terrier - lived for over 20 years. He had his own little house on the deck complete with pre-warmed blankets.

Father Chuck, at the service, remarked that she put ice cubes in the pet's water in hot weather. Some of her cats ate spaghetti. Her friends were treated to her soup; a cure-all for whatever ailed them.

Esther was very comfortable in her new home - just below the original

Vernarelli house - just below the Bakery. From the swing on the deck she could survey the neighborhood, especially watching her grandchildren and their friends.

Esther is survived by her grandson Greg (Kim) Sambrano; great granddaughter Karleigh; great grandsons Chase, Colton, and Kyler; a sister Concelia Vernarelli Picini; a sister-in-law Margaret Morganti Vernarelli; cousins Visia Vernarelli Ham, and Edia Vernarelli Herrman; and second cousins, nieces and nephews. She was predeceased by her husband Henry Babb; her daughter Nadine (Leroy) Sambrano; her brothers Diodato - "Duda", Geremia - "James / Jim", Romeo - "Rome", and Stephano Jr. - "Stevie"; and half brother Luigi Mancini, and half sister Mary Mancini Vernarelli.

Her family meant much to her. Her grandchildren said it all as noted in the obituary at her service: "We love you Grama, you will always be in our hearts."




