Longtime Black Diamond historian dies

BLACK DIAMOND-The man known as Mr. Black Diamond. because of his long-standing passion for perserving the history of this onetime coal mining town, died Sunday in an Enumclaw assisted-living residence.

Carl Henry Steiert was 89. Born Feb. 3, 1911, in Leland. Idaho, he was brought to Black Diamond when he was 6 months old, the adopted child of Joseph and Rosa Steiert who had settled in Black Diamond in 1888. He never left.

He lived much of the history of the town and became part of it. He was never a miner. His career was auto mechanics. He went to work for the Diamond Stage Company in 1926 when he was 15 years old. In the 1960s he bougth its sucessor, the Diamond Garage. He retired in 1974.

He and his wife, Ann, were married for 65 years.

history of Black Diamond area probably wasn't worth knowing. Without him, there might never have been a Black Diamond Historical Museum. Opened in 1982, it is filled with artificats that Sterert donated or helped obtain.

He shared his love of history with school children, civic groups and muesum visitors. He spent a great deal of time as late as last fall at the museum. Print and TV reporters would seek him out for stories on the true happenings of Black Diamond.

"He was the father of the town and the museum," said Bob Eaton, manager of the museum and one of its founders. "He was the backbone of the museum and was a pretty good citizen all the way round.

Steiert also was one of the first volunteer firefighters for Black Diamond Fire District 17 and served as a volunteer firefighter for 25 years. He tried his hand at politics as a member of the Black Diamond

What Carl didn't know about the Planning Commission but later said he was not cut out for politics.

> Instead, if there was a project in town, he was the first to volunteer. Those who knew him called him "the heart and the soul of the town."

Last year, he slowed down a bit. He use a cane to steady himself and he used it his way - with the curled handle facing out, as he explained, put weight directly over the shaft.

He is survived by his wife, Ann in Enumclaw; son Jerry Steiert of Kirkland; daughter Carol Franklin of Auburn; sister Thelma Griffith of Sequim; four grand daughters and one great Grand daughter.

A potluck gathering in memory of Mr. Steiert was held from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Friday at the Black Diamond Community Center, 31605 Third Ave. Memorials may be made to the Black Diamond Historical Society, P.O. Box 232, Black Diamond, WA 98010.
