

PROGRAMS: Chair Howard Botts advised that for our General Membership meeting on April 9th, we had two guest speakers; Dr. Carver Gayton (Director of the Northwest African American Museum of Seattle) and Mrs. Esther Hall Mumford (author and lecturer about African Americans in Washington State's coal mining communities). We hope you were able to attend this piece of "History of the Past". If you were unable to come, you missed a very informative lecture.





Welsh Heritage Day was a success. Steve Israel developed the advertising flyer. JoAnne Matsumura helped with decorating the museum. Dave & Jane

and the earliest baptismal book dating back to 1902. The second baptismal book index started in 1921 has also been transcribed, along with the names on their Memorial Board.

FACILITIES & GROUNDS: Chair Don Malgarini advises that the Plumbing committee went out for bids to replace the plastic pipes with copper, add a 50 gal. hot water tank, run copper water pipes for hot water to kitchen sink, restrooms, basement sink and hot & cold water pipes to shop washtub. Wetton's Plumbing of Enumclaw won the bid for this project. To put the hot water tank in the basement closet as planned; some electrical work needed to be done. Skagen Electric of Enumclaw was contracted to take care of that. This plumbing project has now been completed and is working. It's wonderful to now have hot water in the Museum.

A self-closing mechanism has been installed on the exterior kitchen/meeting room door, so it doesn't slam and rattle the artifacts.

Last fall Gino Picini dug up all the geraniums so they could be wintered-over. This spring he replanted all 106 along the street and around the buildings. Come by and see them, they are so beautiful. Thank you Gino.

Last winter the wooden guardrail on the street, outside the museum was damaged by an out of control vehicle. We have recently found out that the repair of this guardrail is the responsibility of the responsible party's insurance. At this time it is still unknown as to when the damage will be repaired.

A policy has now been written that states that no animals except service dogs will be allowed in the museum. With this in mind, we will also be hanging signs to that effect at the doors of the Museum.

Jones were in charge of putting out the Welsh flags at the cemetery. Steve & Dee Israel gathered them up afterwards. Clayton Mead did a good job as M. C. "Coke" Roberts dressed as a miner and gave a great presentation. Anna Morris' scones were tasty as usual. Don & Lynn Mason did a great job keeping the kitchen running smoothly. Carolyn Bell sold Welsh crafts. Some of the guests commented that they would have liked to have heard more Welsh music and suggested we have Welsh maps & flags for sale. Silk daffodils were handed out to the 89 people in attendance. Thanks to everyone that helped put this all together and make it a success.

Miners Days is coming up on July 7, 8 & 9. Our own Coke Roberts and Keith Watson are going to be involved with that project, as well as a chili cook off near the Union 76 gas station on highway 169.

* Betty Morris Falk, was born Nina Elizabeth Morris Falk, on March 26, 1920 to Jack & Marie Morris. She passed away on April 16, 2006 in Kent, WA.

Betty was a Charter Member of the Society, having joined in 1976.

She spent her early childhood in the coalmining town of Durham, WA, and later in Enumclaw, Washington. She was a graduate of the Enumclaw High School, Class of 1938.

She met and married Carl G. (Charlie) Falk after attending the University of Washington. They had five children.

Betty was an active and involved parent. She was a co-leader of the Kids-n-Kayuses 4-H horse club, the American Field service foreign exchange program, and she tutored for the Renton School District.

Charlie & Betty became active members of the Scandia Folk Dance Society, and participated in Elderhostel programs. Betty's interest in Genealogy took her to document several generations back, as she traveled and did extensive research.

Betty was preceded in death by her husband, Charlie, and daughters Nancy Falk, and Chris Aalto. She is survived by her son Carl David (Georgia) Falk, daughters Roberta Falk, and Janet (Mohammad) Abubakar. Also her siblings, Jack Morris, Evan Morris and Pauline Kombol.

Concelia "Connie" (Vernarelli) Picini Honored & Loved June 11, 1904 - May 24, 2006

Lifetime member **Concelia Picini** (pictured left) was born Angela, Teresa, Maria, Consaglia Vernarelli on June 11, 1904, in Segundo, Colorado to Stefano and Elizabeth (Donato, Mancini) Vernarelli. She

passed away May 24, 2006 at the Vilagio Adult Family Home in New Castle, WA.

Concelia's father, Stefano (a stone mason) came to the United States about 1901, with his brother Ercole (a blacksmith). (Stefano's wife and infant son Diodato remained in Italy). Stefano and Ercole headed for Segundo, Colorado to work at the coalmines. The name suggested it was an Italian populated town, which attracted them. On arriving they found few Italians, and probably did not like having the wages in scrip, instead of cash. Upon learning of Black Diamond, WA, they arrived there in 1902. Finding no employment, although it is reported Stefano did some work on the bakery oven, they returned to Segundo, roughly 20 miles west of Trinidad, Colorado. (Segundo means second mine in the area.

In 1903 the union miners went on strike, demanding an 8-hour workday, instead of 10-14 hours, and wages paid in cash as well as better accounting of their production. The union miners were subjected to intensified violence.

By this time Stefano's wife and child Diodato came to Segundo. On June 11, 1904, Concelia was born in what must have been terrible living conditions. Her father and his brother Ercole were targeted for violent treatment by the mine management because they were active union promoters. The family probably had to live in tents provided by the union outside of town. In December 1904 the family with Ercole fled Segundo and by train arrived in Black Diamond, WA on Christmas Eve.

Concelia's father worked for the mine for sometime, probably above ground only. In due time he developed a fruit and vegetable pedaling business. He had his own large garden, kept a horse, cow, chickens and pigs - all the usual farm life existence. He also had his own baking oven alongside his house below the Black Diamond Bakery, making bread to sell under the name of Page 8 Romeo Bakery. Her mother made cheese, mostly to sell, and bread, and grew many flowers in and outside the house. Concelia's delight was in going to school, but that was interrupted in her teens in order to care for her mother (who was often ill)and her infant brother Stevie.

Concelia met Thomas Picini who came to Canada coal fields from Abruzzi, Italy and then to Black Diamond after World War I working as a union miner. In 1921 Concelia at age 16¹/₂ married Thomas Picini. In a short time they had to leave Black Diamond (a company town) because of a strike by the miners. The miners lost the strike and they could no longer live in the company rented houses. They moved into Morganville where housing was provided for the striking miners. Ironically, it was sort of a repeat from when her family had to leave Segundo, Colorado!

Following the birth of their first child Gino in 1922, the family moved to Tacoma, WA (Rustin), where Thomas took a job at the ASARCO smelter. The house in Black Diamond (just below the bakery) that Concelia was raised in, is still occupied by a Vernarelli, the grandson of Esther Babb, the Greg and Kim (Schakel) Sambrano family.

By 1923 the family moved to Seattle, WA where Dan, Flavia and Tommy were born. The children attended schools in the Rainier Valley area-Brighton and Dunlap Grade schools and Franklin High School.

Being divorced in 1945, she lived singly having several places of residence in the south Rainier Valley area. The start of family get-togethers was at her small house, with a large yard, on Frontenac St. between Seward Park Ave. and Rainier Ave., much remembered by her grandchildren. Also recalled by all are the Christmas Eve celebrations at her apartment overlooking downtown Seattle and the new freeway. For around 25 years straight, with the growth of the family, it got to the point of standing room only, and from her kitchen, all were treated with pastries and pasta. She always had nice Christmas trimmings, and a book suitable for each person.

While her father probably had the most influence on her kitchen skills, her mother must have passed on her love of plants and flowers. Her apartment was a veritable garden. Outside her window she checked on the birds perching in trees and bushes. They probably would have liked to come inside! She liked framed artwork, phonograph records, and books - bookcases were full of them. This was her source of advanced schooling.

Concelia was also a nanny employed by several, including Seattle Mayor Pomeroy. She also worked for Kline Galland Home on Seward Park Ave. She was a born caregiver and baby sitter. At a very young age she was entrusted to hold baby Edo Vanni, the great Seattle baseball player. Continuing to support herself she was employed by the Good Will Industry and a building janitorial service. She wanted to go into real estate sales, having bought and sold several houses in the Rainier Valley area. The requirement to drive a car proved not to be her thing and the venture was dropped.

Concelia enjoyed some traveling. She went on camping trips with the Flavia and Stan Meyer family. In the fall of 1989 she made a trip with Gino, wife Ruth, and Flavia by car to Segundo, Colorado; seeing the church she was baptized in, and the grocery store of that day, still in operation. With Flavia and her son Dale, she was privileged to make a trip to Hawaii at age 98.

Upon leaving her apartment at Hubbell Place she lived with her daughter Flavia in Federal Way for five years. Then on requiring more care she lived in each of the three adult homes that her grandson Dale Meyer, a nurse, had established and managed for six years. Dale closely monitored her diet and medication and once remarked "she is going to live to be 100!"

Through her 4 children there followed 16 grandchildren, 28 great grandchildren, and 6 great great grandchildren."Her children rise up and call her blessed."Proverbs 31:28.

She is pre-deceased by all her siblings, Diodato "Duda" and wife Gladys (Towers), James, Romeo, Stevie, and half brother Luigi Mancini; by sister Esther and husband Henry Babb, half sister Mary (Mancini) and husband Ercole Vernarelli and son Thomas Jr. and son-in-law Stanley Meyer and by granddaughters Elaine Picini, Nancy Picini, grandson Douglas Picini, great granddaughter Liz Picini.

Concelia had many interests, but was content with the simple things of life. She had a special concern for each one of the family. She was a member of Plymouth Congregational Church of Seattle and the Black Diamond Historical Society.

CROESO I GYMRU (Welcome to Wales) By Frank Hammock © 2006

Cyfarchion (Greetings). It was nearing noon on Saturday, June 3rd 2006, and 73 degrees outside under a sunny and cloudless sky. People were beginning to wander into the Black Diamond Museum on Railroad Avenue in Black Diamond, WA for the 8th Annual Welsh Heritage Day festivities. Balloons adorned the wooden platform at this long ago Train Station where the trains have long since vanished and visitors now come by way of automobile. Still more towels scattered strategically about shed precious glimpses to many delightful wonders of the Welsh culture. One gave tribute to the *Great Little Trains of Wales* in such places in the beloved country as Snowdon and Welsh Highland to the north, as well as Gwili Railway and Brecon Beacons to the south. A couple more paid tribute to the richness of the *Welsh language* (Yr Iaith Cymraeg) and the curious visitor learned that "Y cymraeg Ydyw'r laith hynaf a leferir yn Ewrob heddiw" (Welsh is the oldest language in Europe).

Dressed in traditional Welsh garb with black hat, lace, a long dress and a bright red cape, **Ms. JoAnne Matsumura** greeted visitors with a smile and passed out artificial daffodils from a woven basket. This beautiful Welsh flower graciously dotted the interior of the museum



with its familiar bright yellow color that spawned a joyful exchange of staff and visitors alike during this annual festive event and cast a magical atmosphere that prevailed throughout the afternoon.

Inside, visitors were met with an array of wonderful decorations and information that gave true spirit to the Welsh people, culture, and their way of life. Numerous tea towels of varying colors adorned the walls throughout the museum. One was of *Welsh Songs*, with such titles as "All Through the Night" (Ar Hyd Nos), "Men of Harlech" (Rhyfelgyrch Gwyr Harlech), and "The Ash Grove" (Llwyn On). A couple more rendered delightful prose of odes in the form of prayers — one from the *Miners of Wales* called "Cwm Rhondda," while a neighboring towel summed up the blessed country in this way, entitled *My Country*:

My country is beautiful, lovely and fair, With flowers and woods and quarries there, I dream of my country with castles on hills, With dragons and leeks and daffodils.

Beneath the earth there is coal and gold, We have mountains and lakes and cultures of old, Our language and song rings over the Vales, This wonderful country is known as Wales. Near the entrance inside, a couple of tables met the visitor with a few hand made delights for purchase such as Welsh language books and crafts (e.g. pin cushions, cards, lapel pins, canvas bags and more). In another room nearby, glass display cases were covered with informative documentation for the curious, such as Welsh newspapers, maps of Wales, travel books and guides, census documentation of Black Diamond from various years, 3-ring binders showing a

collection of post cards of and from Wales, pamphlets about Welsh dress, recipes, and songs such as the Welsh National Anthem entitled "Hen Wlad Fy Nhadau" (Land of my Fathers). Much of it was free to the taking.



Mr. Malcolm Davies of Orting, WA paid a visit to the festivities sporting a tradition not often seen in the Pacific Northwest. He wore an authentic Welshman's kilt which displayed the Welsh flag in the richness of color with its familiar red dragon surrounded by green and white. Mr. Davies. a

Welshman, originally hails from Cilcennin, in Midwestern Wales, where he obtained the kilt. He spoke of the Welshman who wear such traditional garb to the highland games back in Wales and made mention of such games coming to nearby Enumclaw on the last weekend in July to the King County Fairgrounds for visitors and locals to enjoy.

Outside, Mr. Hank Barnes, assisted by Mr. Donald Botts of the Black Diamond Historical Society, raised the U.S. and Welsh flags on the flag pole in honor of the event.



various prizes given were boxes of chocolates (a favorite choice to the winners), lapel pins showing the Welsh flag, pens, a CD of Welsh music, maps of Wales and more.

Then, the highlight of the day came when Mr. **Conrad 'Coke' Roberts**, the guest speaker and long time

Back inside, near the presentation room, a large tri-fold poster illuminated more culture of the Welsh and their presence in Washington State that has existed now for over a century. A large picture of a labor day picnic showing a large crowd dated circa 1911 adorned the top, followed by a variety of other ads, pictures, and articles throughout. Some addressed the events of the Northwest Welsh Association, articles told of St. David's Day concerts called "Eisteddfod", as well as the "sing gathering" (Gymanfa Ganu). A small note gave a familiar historical flavor that read, "In 1805 Meriwether Lewis was the first Welsh speaker of note to come to the Pacific Northwest. One of the directives of the 'Corps of Discovery' was to find the fabled welsh-speaking Indians." One can't help but wonder if they ever found them.

Soon, music played softly in the background keeping the crowd of between 50 and 70 mingling happily, as they continued to be captured by the timelessness of a country rich in heritage and culture that gave so much to the Black Diamond community as its largest nationality in those early mining days. Time soon slipped effortlessly into the presentations as the MC, Mr. Clayton Mead, led the audience through a few historical thoughts. He then

introduced Mr. Don Malgarini, the Black Diamond Historical Society President and the Honorable Howard Botts, Mayor of Black Diamond. Both gentlemen shared their own humor and thoughts of the festivities and thanked everyone for coming. In between each speaking event, door prizes were awarded from tickets given to the visitors upon their initial arrival. Assisting the MC in this event was **Elisha Watkins**, a gracious young lassie who handed out the raffle tickets to visitors, dressed in traditional Welsh garb. The prior resident of Black Diamond, came out into the crowd clad in miners garb, including a hat, a miners light, a safety lamp, a lunch bucket, and a pick. He conveyed to the gathered audience a brief but colorful history of the Welsh and their humble beginnings in Black Diamond. He spoke of the Superintendent of Mines, Mr. Morgan Morgan, a Welshman, and the company town he managed with a population of over 3000 at the turn of the 20^{th} century. "Morgan Morgan issued a ruling back then," he said, "that there would be only one of everything, such as a barber shop, saloon, and a church." From this Welshman of the past, a standard of living had been set throughout the community that not only ensured the survival of his fellow countrymen and their families, but other nationalities as well. He secured an important contribution to the coal boom that put the small town of Black Diamond on the map not only from coal production but also having the deepest sloped mine in North America. Mr. Roberts utilized large black and white pictures to display some of that local past and told a few stories that were fit for a campfire under a sea of stars.

Finally, two long anticipated prizes remained to



the waiting crowd. One was a large basket of old fashioned candies wrapped in plastic along with a framed trivet of an image of the Museum, a CD and a package of coal candy, won for a second



straight year by long time resident Mr. Evan Morris. The other, was a colorful platter/bowl combination fit for a football afternoon of chips and dip, won by another long time resident Mr. Joe Dal Santo.


Delightful and tasty

refreshments eased the delightful afternoon in the kitchen with a variety of Welsh goodies such as the ever popular Welsh cakes (Pice Ar y Maen), as well as juices and coffee. In the background, a couple more tea towels hung silently on the back wall entitled *Welsh Fare* and *A Welsh Welcome*. They displayed the favorites of the Welsh palette with notes and recipes on various things such as Leeks and Leek Broth (Cawl Cennin), Welsh Rarebit (Caws Pobi), Faggots, Bara Brith, Laver, Cawl, Welsh Chicken (Ffowlin Cymreig), Cockle Pie (Pastai Gocos), and Snowdon Pudding (Pwdin Eryri).

At the end of the festivities, a satisfaction prevailed as a result of the rich culture that permeated the event and the day. A memorable tribute to the Welsh and their contribution to the history of Black Diamond laid forever embedded into the hearts and minds of the visitors. One was left with a feeling of desire deep within the soul to go to where the land of myth and music, literature and art, could only further fill the heart of a life of tradition and song that is ever more timeless than the curious mind could offer here in a land so far away. It was a splendid way to enjoy an afternoon at the 8th Annual Welsh Heritage Day, compliments of the many volunteers and the Black Diamond Historical Society. **Hwyl** (Good bye); **Dymuniadau gorau** (Best Wishes)




On July 4, 1912, the U.S. flag grew to 48 stars with the addition of New Mexico (January 6, 1912) and Arizona (February 14, 1912). Executive Order of President Taft established the proportions of the flag and provided for the arrangement of the stars. This flag was official for 47 years, through two World Wars. Eight Presidents served under this flag beginning with William H. Taft, 1909, and ending with Dwight D. Eisenhower, 1961.


On January 3, 1959 Alaska was formally granted statehood placing the 49th star on our Flag. President Eisenhower provided for the arrangement of the stars. The first 49 star flag was made in the Army Quartermaster Depot at Philadelphia, and was used in the White House ceremony when President Eisenhower signed the proclamation admitting Alaska to the Union. After the ceremonies Senator Hugh Scott gave the flag to Senator Earnest Gruening of Alaska, who, in turn, delivered it to Governor William A. Eagan to be flown over the state capitol at Juneau. The 49 Star flag was official for only one year, until July 4, 1960, when Hawaii achieved Statehood and the 50 Star flag was born. Later the 49 Star Flag was given to the Alaskan State Museum for preservation. President Eisenhower was the only President to serve under this flag. Some sources state that the flag was 'official' for about nine months.

On August 21, 1959 President Eisenhower provided for the arrangement of the stars of the 50

Star Flag. Hawaii was admitted as the 50th state on August 21, 1959. This 27th flag of the United States having nine presidents served under this flag, beginning with President Eisenhower.

THE BLACK DIAMOND HIGH SCHOOL GYM By Coke Roberts

When the Black Diamond High School was built in the early 1920's, there was no money available to build a gymnasium. This created a problem for the Black Diamond School District because the State Superintendent of Instruction required Physical Education to be part of the basic school curriculum. To meet the PE requirement the Pacific Coast Coal Company donated a meeting hall that had been built down at Mine 11 to house workers who did not go out on strike. The coal company that owned the land that made up Black Diamond kicked out of town, all the miners who went out on strike in 1920-21. The United Mine Workers Union with help from Tom Morgan built houses in Morgansville for the striking miners.

The coal company, after the strike was over, donated the meeting hall to the school district and it was moved from Mine 11 to the schoolyard next to the grade school. Lines for playing basketball were painted on the floor and baskets were put in place. There were no dressing rooms or restrooms in the hall. To change clothes or go to the restroom you could use the basement in the grade school, which was about 20 yards from the gym. The hall was barely big enough to practice in and the ceiling was so low it was almost impossible to take a long shot. Falling down often led to slivers in your knees.

It should be noted that Mr. Cobb's woodshop class under the direction of D. K. Porter laid the floor in the new gym. Mr. Porter was also the secretary of the school board.

Another interesting feature of the "new" gym was an electric scoreboard built by students Gordy Roberts and Tom Zumek. The design of the scoreboard was taken from an article in a Popular Science magazine. The boys built the scoreboard in Mr. Cobbs manual training class. Mr. Carnino, the school custodian, helped with the electrical work so the school board could be sure to meet the county electrical code. The electrical scoreboard was the only electrical scoreboard found in all of the other basketball



gyms in the Snoqualmie Basketball League. (You can see the scoreboard in the Black Diamond Museum.)

The first league basketball game was played in the new gym in October of 1939. On the team were Clyde Johnson, Gordy Roberts, Stan Celigoy, Tom Zumek, Glen Fredericksen, Coke Roberts and Fred Woods. Mr. Frank Hoagle was coach of the team. Don Botts was the team manager.

After the closing of the high school in 1943 the gym was used for community events. The gym was then owned by the Enumclaw School District as part of the deal to turn all Black Diamond School District property over to the Enumclaw District in 1944.

In 1991 the Enumclaw School District resolved to give the gym to the Black Diamond Community Center for a total of one dollar. With the vision of the Black Diamond Community Centers founding director, Dorothy Botts, and her husband Mayor Howard Botts, a plan was formed to move the gym to city property at 25511 Lawson Street, which is behind the old hospital. With grants from organizations in the state the gym was moved on February 12, 1992 at a cost of \$100,000. Throughout the years many improvements were added; heating, a new roof, rear deck, windows, and other projects for an additional \$90,000.

Plans are underway for the refurbished gym to be opened as a community recreation center in 2006.


