


SECRETARY REPORT By Dee Israel

ARCHIVES: At our January 2006 board meeting, the members and Chair JoAnne Matsumura began discussing the idea of finding a new home for the Veterinary X-ray machine and Autoclave, (officially a therapeutic machine that is primarily for horses) that had been donated by Dr. Nicholls of Redmond many years ago. This equipment did not meet our mission and coals and

equipment did not meet our mission and goals, and since it was not a Black Diamond artifact it was felt it would be better displayed at another facility. Chair JoAnne Matsumura spent a lot of time trying to locate a new home for it. She first contacted Enumclaw Historical Society, but they didn't have room for it. The Buckley Historical Society was then contacted, but weren't interested. The Redmond Historical Society then showed an interest in getting it, but they changed their mind. The Eastside Historical Society then showed an interested, but then decided against accepting it. JoAnne even checked a second time with Enumclaw before inquiring of WA State University. They were not interested, so she made an inquiry of Seattle/King County Human Society and The Fort Lewis Museum. Still no luck! But, all of this was not a complete waste of time, because a week or so ago we found a message on our answering machine from a lady that said WSU had contacted her that we had an artifact that her father had donated and we no longer could use. We are happy to announce that the Veterinary machine is now at it's new home "Blue Spruce Animal Farm" with the daughters of the original owner.

REMEMBERING STEVE & EVA'S

On a recent cold and windy day sorting through some old 'stuff' from a sales dealer of post cards at a local show, this business card of "Steve & Eva's Auto Court" caught my eye. I added it to the growing pile of cards and other paper goods, and purchased them all from the well-known dealer.

It didn't take long of asking 'around town' if anyone remembered "Steve & Eva's", when Joan Nachtshiem Malgarini suggested that I write to Steve & Donna Mae Savick Casper. Several people remembered the good hamburgers they ate at Steve & Eva's.

About a week later Steve Casper wrote me a letter and shared his memories and a bit of history of Steve & Eva's, owned by his parents Steve and Eva Casper. The elder Steve Casper has passed on, but Eva had her 90th birthday during the summer of 2006, and currently lives in the Puyallup area.

Steve & Eva operated the small grocery store, service station, little drive-in restaurant, known as the "Chatterbox", and a large cabin court that also included trailer parking spaces known as "Alton's Auto Court". They lived there from 1947 to 1952.

The scenery and the landscape have changed over time. Steve tells us, "There currently is a small, modern convenience store located at the original site of my parents store on the north side of Griffin Ave. on the west side of Enumclaw heading towards Auburn. During a recent drive-by-visit, I've noticed that all the original buildings are no longer there. At the time we lived there, Enumclaw's west city limits sign was across the street from the store as indicated on the business card".

Thank you Steve for sharing your memories with us, and bringing fond memories to those among our membership who frequented Steve & Eva's establishment. Please express our regards to Eva.

The Life and Legacy of Black Diamond's "Miner" Mike

Mr. Burke tells a simple story about how Miner Mike had asked if he would accompany him in the purchase of a new pickup and relinquish the old one that had worn out its service. Mr. Burke recalls:

" I am at home one day in my yard and Mike comes walking up the hill and he says to me, 'Bob, I am gonna go look at buying a new truck. Would you go with me?' So, I said, sure. So we go into Fugate Ford [in Enumclaw] because he wanted a Ford. So, I asked him what kind of a truck he wanted and he said 'Well I want a ³/₄ ton, two-wheel drive, don't need a four-wheel drive.' So, I said okay, let's go look. So, we go in there and we get a salesman and they take us out to the car lot, and they only had three of them on the lot for what he wanted. We start looking at these three and the salesman is doing his sales pitch and going on and on and on and Mike doesn't want to hear any of this stuff, he just wants to look at these trucks. So, finally I am standing by Mike and looking at the trucks with him and remember that there was a tan colored one, a blue one, and a green one. After about 15 minutes of looking, I am just kinda following Mike as he is looking through these different trucks and he is not really asking any questions, and the salesman is talking the whole time. Finally, Mike looks at me and says, 'Bob, which one do you like?' And I said, well Mike, it really doesn't make any difference to me because it's your choice and your truck, you choose whatever you want, whichever one you'd like to have. So, all of a sudden Mike says, 'No, no, which one do you like?' Well, I said, if it was me, I kinda like the tan one. So, Mike looked at the salesman and said 'I'll take that tan one right there.' We went into the dealership and Mike asked, 'How much is the price on it?' The salesman told him the sticker price and Mike wrote out a check for the full sticker price of the truck, and that was it. We got the temporary license and the keys and out the door we

went. He didn't dicker around with the price at all and was more interested in what my opinion was. ... the truck was completely different than what he was use to [driving] so the salesman had asked him if he wanted to test drive the thing and Mike says 'No, no, I'm fine, I can drive. I don't need a test drive.' This was a fancier truck, more horsepower and power brakes and power steering so the salesman insisted that he go for a drive just to show Mike how to operate the new features. So Mike and the salesman get in the truck and take off and it was lucky there were no cops around because by the time he got to the Fairgrounds he must have been doing about 65 mph, he was out of control, he was everywhere, and all over the place. The salesman said he was just hanging on hoping to get back alive...but for him not to dicker with that salesman and just write him out a check for the full price and I'm sittin' there thinking, Mike how can you do this, you can save yourself four or five thousand bucks – just tell the guy, hey, what's my best deal. He just wanted to write out the check and get back home."

On February 3rd, 1994, Miner Mike passed away as a result of his medical complications. He was 75 years old. The Burke's obtained legal permission to handle his affairs and began a search of his home to determine who he was, if he had any surviving family, and what to do with what little he had. From a simple collection of newspaper articles, pictures, notes, papers, and things found in his home, as well as a few local records and residents who could remember anything at all, a few details became clear about some of Miner Mike's life like the wake of an archeological dig.

Miner Mike was born on September 24th, 1919, as Michael Donald Bathavic, and was one of four children with a Catholic upbringing to Joseph and Beatrice (Gravish) Bathavic. His sister, Anna, who later lived in Cahooes, NY, maintained an interest in gardening with Mike, as correspondence found in his home had revealed. As a young man, he became a pick miner for bituminous coal in Broad Top City, in Pennsylvania's south central coal mining region. In 1943, at the height of the United States involvement in World War II and at the age of 23, he entered into military service as a Private First Class. He worked as a Jackhammer Operator and served faithfully in the U.S. Army's 246th Engineering Combat Battalion, Company A. His older brother Thomas, who served in the Army at the same time he did during the war, was also a coal miner. His other brother Anthony, also older, was a machinist for Boeing and had worked here in Washington for 10 years before he retired in 1965 and returned to Pennsylvania. Of the four siblings, neither Mike nor Anthony ever married.

While in military service, Mr. Bathavic fought in four campaigns - Central Europe, Normandy, Rhineland, and Northern France. He was a qualified Rifle Marksman, and his few decorations and citations were as follows: Distinguished Unit Badge, World War II Victory Medal, Good Conduct Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, and a Bronze Arrowhead awarded to his entire Battalion for the following citation, found from a copy in his home of the General Orders specifically for this award dated 23 August, 1945 – "for having participated in the initial amphibious assault landings with Forces 'O' and 'B' on the Normandy Coast, France, 6 June 1944." After a faithful tenure and with only a 7th grade education, he returned to his grass roots in Broad Top City, PA after being honorably discharged from active duty in December of 1945 at the convenience of the Government due to demobilization.

In the Autumn of 1948, Mr. Bathavic traveled to Black Diamond in search of work in the coal mines and joined the Local Union 6481. Employment records from Palmer Coking Coal Company, and other sources, show that he worked as a miner from October of 1948 until September of 1957 in Black Diamond's #12 Mine, and also in the Landsburg Mine near Ravensdale.

From the few possessions found within his home not long after his passing, the following perhaps held some meaning to him: a Veterans of Foreign Wars membership card of 1948 in Huntingdon, PA; a dog license dated 1943 for a 4 year old Beagle; military discharge papers; a few newspaper clippings and pictures from his Pennsylvania origin as well as local to Black Diamond (such as the Black Diamond volunteer Fire Department District No. 17 from 1954 Seattle Times showing the siren box with Mrs. Alice Davies of the Davies Confectionary sounding the alarm, and

another showing firemen Tom, Joe, and Frank Zumek running from their store still wearing aprons in response to the siren); black and white pictures of some of his family members from 1966; newspaper obituaries of his two brothers; Bituminous Miner's Certificate of Competency and Qualification dated in 1941 from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Mines; draft board registration card dated December 19th, 1945; a Winchester model 94 carbine 30-30 rifle; and an early map of Black Diamond Townsite, page 2, showing various lots around Baker and Park streets and from 5th street to Railroad Avenue. Also found sitting serenely on a shelf in one of the bookcases were two very thick wallets and held captive within their deteriorating leather folds was approximately \$8,500 in cash in one-hundred dollar denominations - perhaps his only trusted method of banking.

Also found was an interesting small handwritten note in cursive, undated, and spelled exactly as he wrote it, that read:

Evidence how was i in N.Y. wen i was in Pa tring to find work and was on 20 Dollars a Weak until i found work. Michael Bathavic

A small rectangular tin box was found with faded color and a design depicting scenes from the Middle East. Inside, was a United Mine Workers of America receipt card for dues for Local Union 6481 of Black Diamond and signed by the Financial Secretary, Harry English. Also contained within the tin were numerous yellowed article clippings and pictures from the Seattle Times and Intelligencer depicting a devastating mine cave-in at the 500-foot level on January 7th, 1954, in the Landsburg Mine, that involved Mr. English. Deeper within the tin box, a full-page pictorial article was found about Robert T. Montgomery, age 80, from Enumclaw, entitled "Reminiscent Judge Mixes Wit and Wisdom." (Seattle Times, Sunday, December 27th, 1953)

His body and what few possessions he had were shipped back to Pennsylvania to be laid to rest with those in his family who had gone before him. His house and truck were sold, what few bank accounts he had were liquidated and the money was split between his nephews and one niece in Pennsylvania. What little time the Burke's could spend with Mr. Bathavic, since he was so private, had revealed no lasting friends who remained in Black Diamond. As a result, no memorial service could be held in his honor. No family ever came forward from Pennsylvania to assist in the settlement of his estate. Thus, from the history of Black Diamond, a miner will be silently remembered for his faithful military service to his country, his service in the coal mines of Washington and Pennsylvania, his uniqueness, honesty, and a simple way of life with a seemingly deeprooted pride for whatever little things in life that meant a lot to him.

But, before we depart, let me at least take a moment to lay to rest a rumor that has circulated through the years about the illusive "Miner" Mike. It was at one time thought that from deep beneath his home on 5th Avenue, a mine shaft was dug where he had acquired his own coal for monetary gain and personal use – which spawned the nickname "Miner" Mike. From a careful examination of the house not long after his passing, no such shaft was ever found and the only things found within his basement were a loosely packed dirt floor, a few miscellaneous things, some hand and garden tools, and the dampened, musty smells of an old house.


May he rest in peace, "Miner" Michael Donald Bathavic, who lived in Black Diamond from 1948 until his death in 1994 – a citizen of 46 years.
