# SECRETARY REPORT

A lot of projects have been accomplished this year.

#### FACILITIES & GROUNDS:

- 1. Replacement number plaques were purchased and installed on the railroad ties.
- 2. A shadow box has been made for the new danger sign and is now on display. Another one is in the process of being made to put the old sign in.
- 3. A Plumber was hired and we now have hot water in the restrooms, basement & kitchen and hot & cold water to a new sink in the shop.
- 4. The hitching rail & posts that were rotting have now been replaced.
- 5. Gravel donated by Palmer Coking Coal has been spread in front of the jail to keep members and guests from walking in mud to get in the Museum.
- 6. A door closure has been installed on the kitchen door to keep the door from slamming and rattling the pictures on the wall.
- 7. An Electrician was hired to take care of some wiring up grade that was needed in the vault.
- 8. There has been several items added to the simulated mine; such as hardhat, tools, danger sign, and telephone.
- 9. A donated chair has had the seat re-covered and looks very nice in the lobby.
- 10. The desk that had belonged to Dr. Botts is now in the Museums Dr.'s office.
- 11. The original Company Store Safe has been donated and is now in the lower level.
- 12. A lighted "OPEN" sign has been bought and placed in a window to draw more visitors to the Museum during open hours.

#### **OTHER PROJECTS:**

- 1. The Cemetery photo project is completed now. It was a time consuming project that took Steve Israel & his committee 2 years to accomplish.
- 2. We have now adopted an Animal Control Policy for the Museum. A "No Animals Except Service



Dogs allowed in the Museum" sign is in the process of being installed.

3. The Black Diamond Historical Society has become a member of the Maple Valley/Black Diamond Chamber of Commerce, which should give us more public exposure.

4. A 6' x 10', nylon, United States flag has been purchased and a light beams on it during the night as it flies 24-7.

### EDUCATION/OUTREACH: Chair Coke

Roberts has brought about the following:

- 1. "Black Diamond goes to War" which has brought in some nice responses and results.
- A "Tea" was held on October 13<sup>th</sup>, for the Principal & 14 Teachers of the Black Diamond Elementary School to get acquainted and to introduce them to the Museum. Coke says he is planning another "Tea" and lecture with the PTA Board. He also plans to volunteer to speak at WA State History classes in local high schools.
- 3. Coke has had colored posters made and distributed around town to advertise Old Town Black Diamond. These posters have been well received.

4. Coke Roberts announced that the All Black Diamond School 2007 Reunion will be held on Wed. June 6<sup>th</sup>.

- 5. Tour Chair, Don Mason announces that the next Franklin tour will be March 3<sup>rd</sup> at 1:00.
- 6. A suggestion has been made that we combine Welsh Day with Miners Day and have Miners Heritage Day. We would like to hear what you (the membership) thinks about this.

# COLLECTION COMING IN MEMORY OF PAUL BOTTS

In early 2007 the Society will be the recipient of a collection of copies of the Pacific Coast Bulletins. The donation in memory of Paul Maine Botts is for the Society's Archives, from Society Member and Volunteer JoAnne Matsumura. The collection spans 1914-1930s.

The collection begins in 1914, and was published by The Pacific Coast Company, Seattle, WA. In each issue they published their articles in four languages, English, Italian, Austrian and Swedish. The collection spans into the 1930s, although some issues could not be located.

In 1916 the Pacific Coast Company began a "New Series", as Vol. 1 No.1. They began including photographs and launched their 'Briquet' icon in the first issue. They continued the articles in the four languages.

During several turbulent years before 'the strike' there were no issues published until the first issue of their after the strike series first appearing on October 1, 1921. The publication no longer showed the articles in foreign languages beginning with 1921.

Over the years their publication featured special sections that included information from their correspondents in: Black Diamond, Burnett, Carbonado, Issaquah, New Black Diamond, Newcastle, South Prairie, and West Coast (near Newcastle), Washington. They also included information about the other 'camps' inside and outside of King and Pierce Counties.

The Bulletins include many obituaries of past Black Diamond residents and environs. These will be extracted and included in the Society's Around Town Series, at the Research Center by the Front Desk Entrance.

The Pacific Coast Bulletins will be a welcome addition to the Archives, as the 'Bulletin' served as the 'mining camps newspaper' for Black Diamond families and environs. The collection has been stated for Reference use only.

### HUGGING PAID A CHURCH DEBT By JoAnne Matsumura

In 1926 "A Hugging Social" paid off a church debt, as recorded in a 1926 issue of the Pacific Coast Bulletin. A clipping from the Osborne, Mo., Enterprise stated; "They paid off a church debt down in North Greenfield Church, near Springfield, the other night with a hugging social. Eight hundred people attended and \$75 was raised. The rates were; girls under 15, for a two-minute hug, 15 cents; girls 15 to 20, same for 25 cents; girls 20 to 25, same for 50 cents; other men's wives, same for 75 cents and old maids, 3 cents and no time limit."

For every hug you give and get, put a penny in a jar, and pay off a debt. Pennies *are* still worth a lot!

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

Society Newsletter January 1977 From the Archives

## The Life and Legacy of Black Diamond's "Miner" Mike

The bustling staff wearing lab coats, stethoscopes, and smiles gave Mr. and Mrs. Robert Burke a very warm but caring reception as they arrived at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. They had been summoned to the room of their neighbor, a distant friend and acquaintance from Black Diamond, known to the locals only as "Miner" Mike. At times he lay catatonic in his hospital bed, an unresponsive by product of some distant past, revealing nothing to no one of who he really was or where he came from. The hospital chart labeled him as "John Doe" and the Burke's knew him only as "Mike." His diagnosis was grim and complications grew from pneumonia, emphysema, sepsis, and acute renal problems. With each subsequent visit, the face of death grew closer and closer to becoming Miner Mike's only next of kin. The Burke's stayed in the room for a while and watched as he breathed with quiet, shallow breaths. They could only think back on what little they knew about this reclusive but simple man and imagine the nuances of his life.

They met Miner Mike one day back in 1990, when he had walked up to the Burke's home in Black Diamond, just a few blocks to the north and up a hill from his own house. With a quiet but carefully guarded voice, he had asked for some wood to heat up his small wood stove. From that seemingly shy encounter, a distant but quiet relationship had formed. The Burke's gave their unconditional friendship and support to Miner Mike and were always glad to assist in whatever he needed. They brought him dinner on many occasions and since he rarely offered them into his home, they randomly checked to insure that his fireplace chimney was active - a tell-tale sign of the hopeful presence of warmth during those often frosty and snow-filled winters. Mr. Burke recalled that Miner Mike made a few trips to Maple Valley to dine and socialize at Caruso's Restaurant and Lounge, returning home on many evenings with a fictional magnet tied to the front bumper of his old Chevy pickup that seemed to attract things like fence posts, garbage cans, and more. Miner Mike trusted no one but the Burke's for his needs and in the four short years they had known him, he was very

much a loner, had few visitors if any, and gave no allowance to anyone hoping to gain a deeper relationship with this illusive man. He did things according to his rules and when *he* wanted to do them. He was a rebel, and seemed quite distant to others except during those roaring nights at Caruso's.

Back in the quiet room at Harborview, Miner Mike coughed a bit then opened his eyes. The Burke's sat motionless at his bedside to see if he was responsive. They tried to communicate with him and at times, asked if he knew where he was. They tried tending to his affairs by asking if he'd be willing to draft up a Will, or if he had any family in the area, as the remaining time of his life grew ever shorter. He continued to be unresponsive. They continued to reflect a little more on what they knew about this man.

Miner Mike lived in a small wood house at the corner of 5<sup>th</sup> and Park Streets in Black Diamond. In the few visits they made to his place, the Burke's remember a house that was relatively untidy, dusty, unfurnished, and ice cold except for a small living room downstairs, where he spent most of his time when at home. He slept in a very small bedroom behind a nearby wall off from the living room. Within the living room were a small wood stove, a small chair, a radio, possibly a TV, and a couple of bookcases that stored miscellaneous things and numerous National Geographic magazines. The upstairs maintained the look of emptiness but did



harbor a few furnishings, but was mostly used for storage. Throughout the house, the air was stale, musty, and damp. His only live-in companion

was a very large and intimidating black dog that kept vigilance near him and barked incessantly at everything that approached the house – like a sentinel appointed to keep watch over this pridefilled man of few possessions. (*To be continued in our next BDHS Newsletter*)
