Ralph, 89, passed on peacefully at home after a gradual decline in health. He was cared for by his loving family. Born to Giovanni and Adelina Banchero in Black Diamond, he was

the youngest of nine children. He grew up on the family farm, which has always been a center of his life. Eventually he moved to Seattle to work at his brother, Ed's, meat market (E&E MEATS) until he retired. Having a gregarious personality, he enjoyed being a salesman and had more friends than we could count.

He was a son, brother, father, grandfather, uncle, cousin, and best friend. Loving music and dance, his home was filled with Polka music. One could always count on the 10 minute ride, a daily wake up call at 6 am to ask what you are doing, and his affectionate pulling of ears. When teasing someone, he had a twinkle in his bright blue eyes and his trademark smirk! Generous in spirit and possessions, he was well loved and respected. Also, true to his Italian heritage he made regular trips to Italy visiting family and friends. There was much love shared. Ralph is survived by five children (and spouses): Lynn, Lori Banchero, Les Banchero, Larry Banchero, and Chris Banchero; 14 grandchildren, and 25 great grandchildren. His significant other was Eloise Drake and her children Kim Boeringa, Jody Boeringa, Lana Walden and families.

As a young man he worked for Crystal Mountain as a

His specialty was kids, he could get along with them, bond with them and always get a laugh or a smile from them. They did not realize he could hardly see them; he never let his diminishing sight stop him. He was witty and had many stories about Black Diamond and our residents. Leslie, 51, was born January 13, 1996 on Capitol Hill. The family moved to Bainbridge Island when Leslie was in preschool and she grew up there. She graduated from Bainbridge High School and was a member of the choir where she developed her love of singing. She

later attended Seattle University. She is survived by her father Bill Cooley and brother Jim Cooley.

Leslie joined the Bainbridge Island Assembly and served as Worthy Advisor, she was the Grand Representative of Rhode Island in 1983 and was initiated in Eastern Star n 1984. She served as a Mother Advisor and served on the board as secretary and treasurer. In Eastern Star she served as Worthy Matron twice, Dresden Star Deputy Instructor and as the Grand Representative of Kansas 2016-2018.

Leslie was a founding member and Director of Administration/Secretary for Haunted and was instrumental in creating the non-profit. Her grandfather was a key figure in the creation of Royal Arch Park.
